


NAMI Connection Celebrates a Successful Rollout

The NAMI Connection program has come a long way since February 2007, when the program was first piloted in Connecticut. Since that first training, the program has hosted over 100 national and state facilitator training events, training nearly 2,000 support group leaders; we have expanded to 45 states in less than three years; we have trained over 100 national and state trainers to continue program growth; we have seen the development of over 400 NAMI Connection groups across the country, and have reached nearly 40,000 participants - 6,000 of which are brand new NAMI Connection! All of this, and NAMI Connection is just getting started.

The program rollout success is due to several combined efforts. Between five expert National Connection Field Managers, an incredible pool of national Connection trainers, highly talented state trainers, hard working state and affiliate leaders, as well as some of the most dedicated people on the planet – NAMI Connection facilitators – this program has taken off in an explosive fashion.

Although our statistics are exciting, this program is more than just numbers... NAMI Connection is a movement. Connection empowers those living well in recovery and gives people a chance to give back. The program provides hope, encouragement, understanding, and of course: sincere uncritical acceptance. NAMI Connection changes lives.

Those of us at the National office are just so pleased with the success of the NAMI Connection rollout, and we realize this was a big cross-organizational group effort. We know thousands of people have benefited from the results of our combined dedication and hard work. To everyone in Connection: thank you all so much, and we can't wait to continue working with you!

In honor of Veteran's Day, NAMI Connection is proud to spotlight Connection Facilitator and Veteran, Candace True

The NAMI Connection group at the WBJ DORN VA Medical Center (VAMC) in Columbia, SC has been meeting for almost 2 years. It was a slow beginning and I was the sole facilitator until I began mentoring someone last Spring. The first few months I sat alone waiting for someone to show up. The group has now grown to the size that if everyone showed up at once we would have around 17 attendees. We have a good core group of 5-6 people, and Providers are now recommending clients attend the group.

Veterans have a unique relationship with each other. It doesn't matter where you served, what service you were in, when you served, combat or a 'desk job', "we were all in the same foxhole together". It is a camaraderie that cannot be broken or explained to those who did not serve. We speak the same jargon and often do not have to go into a lot of detail to understand the emotions we feel. Connection allows us to support each other as peers.

We recently had five Veterans go through a Connection facilitator training and in early 2010 we are planning to begin a NAMI Connection women's group in the VAMC. Within a year, plans are underway to begin a group at one of the rural Veteran Community Based Outpatient Centers.
